



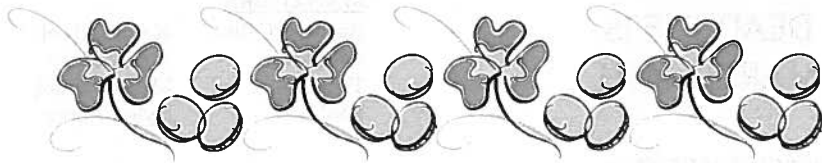

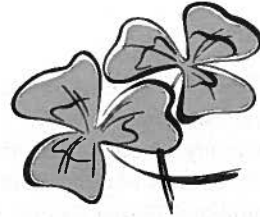
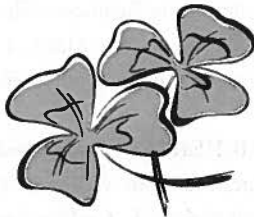

HOMESTEAD IN THE WILLOWS HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION

Regular Board Meeting February 8, 2011 – Unofficial Minutes

CALL TO ORDER: Board President, Reed Richardson, called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Other Board Members present were Scott Lenamond, Christopher Molke, Chris Raab and Bill Shelden; as well as Business Manager, Katie Kidwell; Pool Manager, Jaylene Jones; Landscape Manager, Nancy Bauer; and Mark Peterson of Water Ketch Inc.

MINUTES: The minutes of the January, 2011 regular Board Meeting were approved as read.

SWIM TEAM: No report

FINANCIAL REPORT: Bookkeeper John Fitzgerald presented the financial report. Over 24% of homeowners had paid their annual assessments adding \$187,010 to the operating fund revenues. Expenses for January totaled \$65,734 and included \$ 33,731 for the HOA liability insurance, \$12,028 for trash and utilities and \$11,927 in land maintenance expenses. The Association had been audited the last week of January and once the auditors finished their review the amount owed the Reserve Fund would be transferred. A discussion of how best to account for reserve fund expenditures followed. The Association has one checking account called the operating fund from which all expenses are paid even though some of the items are allocated to the reserve fund. Reed commented that the reserve fund is for significant capital expenses identified in the Reserve Study completed in 2010, so while the balance may look robust, it is earmarked for future expenditures. John explained that everyone who lives in the neighborhood contributes equally through their assessments to the reserve fund even though some of the expenditures might happen after a family has moved from the neighborhood. John wanted to be sure the managers understood that when they assigned an expense to the reserve fund for payment, that it was truly a capital expense. The Board then discussed the Perimeter Fence Fund and confirmed with John that although the loan which financed the rebuilding of the perimeter fence had been paid, a portion of the dues assessments continued to accrue for annual maintenance of the fence. The Board agreed to indicate the fence portion of the dues assessments as a separate line item in the budget.

MANAGER REPORTS

1. **POOL:** Pool Manager, Jaylene Jones, reported that she and the Swim Team parent reps were still trading telephone calls regarding propane. Reed repeated the Boards desire that they share expenses in some way.
2. **LANDSCAPE:** Landscape Manager, Nancy Bauer, introduced Mark Peterson of Water Ketch Inc. Mark reviewed his background and years in the business and answered questions from the Board about the irrigation system. The system is over 30 years old and the lateral piping is constantly breaking. Water Ketch is renovating it section by section. Although the association had a new sprinkler design prepared by Rockne Corty Design in 2009, Mark couldn't always follow it exactly. He might encounter a tree root or some

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other obstruction that forced him to modify the original design. The Board was concerned about having some sort of map of the renovation work. Mark will provide the HOA with copies of all the sketches and modifications to them. Mark emphasized that his "maps" were designed for sprinkler techs in the field to use. They would not be easily followed by a lay person. Bill asked if a map for Board Members could be developed. Mark agreed it could, but his goal had been to put the HOA money into the irrigation system, not the mapping of that system. Bill asked if Mark could show the Board Members how to shut off the system in case Mark was ever unreachable and plans were made to do so. Nancy announced to the Board that the Perimeter Fence had been hit by cars in two places over the last week. The drivers had not notified the HOA and she asked that something be published in the Herald asking drivers to step forward when HOA property was damaged.

3. **TENNIS:** Tennis Manger, Melissa Shuck, reported that crack repair had been scheduled for the week of May 23, 2011.
4. **BUSINESS:** Business Manager, Katie Kidwell, reported that a property that had been in covenant non-compliance had been sold and the new owners had agreed to a timetable under which to make the necessary improvements to the property. The homeowner group that formed to fight Xcel's vegetation management policy had hired a lawyer and continued to move forward. The Department of Regulatory Agencies had formed a new information office requiring our HOA to register with them for a small fee. Xcel Energy had approached the Business Office about obtaining an easement to access a failing line. The Board discussed how best to handle the easement request and still protect HOA property.
5. **ACC:** No meeting had been held in January.

OLD BUSINESS: The LightSquared easement agreement was on hold due to a change in personnel in the company and their need to coordinate with Xcel. The HOA attorney and Comcast had agreed on a service contract, but it was not ready in time for the Board Meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Chris Raab moved and Christopher Molke seconded that the HOA retain the firm of Kennedy Childs & Fogg as counsel for the HOA in the suit brought by two homeowners concerning the remodel of a neighboring house. The motion passed unanimously. Chris Raab moved and Scott Lenamond seconded that the Board declare an Executive Session following the adjournment of the regular meeting to discuss the legal situation brought by the Dunbar-Horneck lawsuit. The motion passed unanimously.

ADJOURNMENT AND CALENDARING: The meeting was adjourned at 8:44 p.m. The next regular Board Meeting will be on Tuesday, April 12th at 6:30pm at the Business Office.

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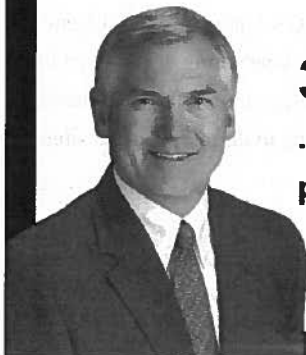
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CENTENNIAL NEWS

Transition of Coyote Management Services

After two years of public outreach about how to live with coyotes, the City of Centennial no longer has a Coyote Management Technician on staff. This program was created due to citizen concern for public safety. Throughout the last two years, Centennial has focused on public outreach and raising awareness of how to live with coyotes and respond to coyote conflicts.

Residents should contact Centennial's Animal Services Division to report coyote sightings, observations, encounters and incidents. Animal Welfare Officers will complete a Coyote Incident Report based upon a caller's experience in order to maintain regular reporting. The City will use this information to provide a quarterly map to illustrate the location of sightings, observations, encounters and incidents as has been done for the past two years.

March Landscape Tips

You know that March has arrived, 'when the sun shines hot and the wind blows cold: when it is summer in the light and winter in the shade'! With spring around the corner here is a landscaping check list:

*If you didn't cut back perennials and clean up flower beds in the fall begin to do these tasks this month before new spring growth appears. If you wait too long to begin clean up tasks you are likely to damage delicate new growth.

*Check evergreens for browning and deciduous trees for buds that have died, and deep water.

*Water your lawn if you see evidence of spider mites; thinning grass, soil exposed, excessive yellowing or browning of grass blades



Snow Mold

Gazing at the frozen tundra that our yards have become, the coming of spring must seem a distant dream. Months after the first big storm, the white stuff continues as snow mold. Though it kills grass blades, it rarely kills the crown and your lawn should grow back healthy this spring. Before spring arrives, give your grass an assist in getting rid of its fungal fuzz. Rake the grass, fluffing the blades and exposing the area to air and sunlight.



Right Tree Right Place

As the spring planting season approaches it is interesting to note that trees properly placed around residences and buildings can save up to 30% on heating and cooling costs.

Summer Cooling

"West is Best", planting trees on the west side of your home will provide the greatest summer cooling benefits. Second best place is the east side. By planting (2) 25' shade trees on the west and (1) on the east you could save over 20% of you're A/C bill per year!

Winter Warming

Evergreen trees should be planted on the north and northwest sides of your home to block cold winter winds. Avoid planting on the south side, which can block the winter warming sun late in the day.

Pruning

Winter months are a great time to prune many trees and shrubs. American elm, apple, crabapple, and Mountain ash trees are among those that need pruning during this time. Dormant pruning is beneficial because a tree's branch structure is readily visible and there are fewer disturbances to gardens. It is advantageous to thin shrubs during the winter to encourage healthy spring growth.



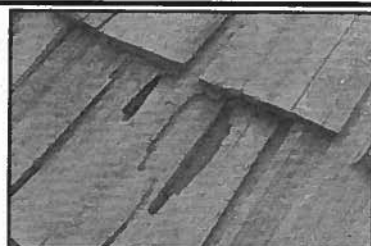

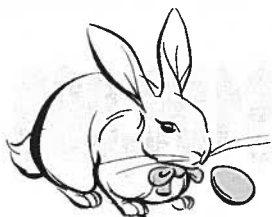

CHERRY CREEK SCHOOLS GETS HIGHEST MARK FOR EFFECTIVE SPENDING

An independent study has ranked the Cherry Creek School District among the highest in Colorado for effective use of funds for academic achievement.

The Center for American Progress compared spending by school districts nationwide to state math and reading test results for the 2007-2008 school year. The study included school districts with 250 students or more.

The Cherry Creek School District received a "Green" rating indicating the highest return on investment (ROI) of use of funding for student success. The return on investment measure rates the academic achievement of school districts for each dollar spent compared to other districts in the state.

Overall, the study found that school districts that target more dollars to the classroom and less on administration fared much better. Cherry Creek Schools spends more than 80% of its General Fund budget on direct and indirect instruction and less than 5% on central administration costs.

"Despite having to reduce spending by more than \$40 million during the last three years, the Cherry Creek School District has been able to protect the classroom and maintain our focus on student success," said Superintendent Mary Chesley. "The classroom lies at the heart of our mission *'to inspire every student to think, to learn, to achieve, to care.'*"

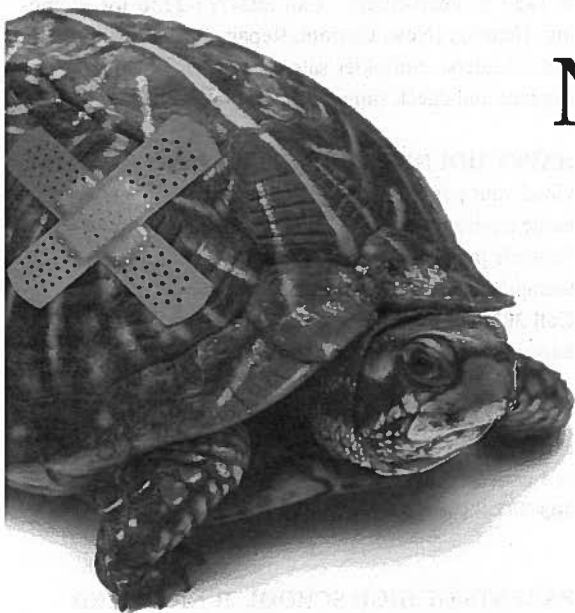

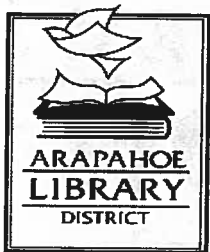
